The Pittsburgh Card

Effect: The magician can determine a spectator's card by simply dealing cards and spelling out PITTSBURGH.

Preparation: You will need 21 playing cards. Lay the playing cards out in 3 columns with 7 cards in each column.

Method:

- I) Lay out the playing cards as described above. Ask a spectator to mentally pick out a card. Have them tell you what row it is in.
- 2) Next, collect each column and place the group of cards in the selected row in between the other two groups of cards (first time).
- 3) Lay out the cards again in the same way, 3 across and 7 down (row by row, dealing across 1, 2, 3-1, 2, 3, etc.).
- 4) Again, ask the spectator what row his card is in. Collect each column and place the group of cards in the selected row in between the other two groups of cards (second time).
- 6) Lay out the cards again in the same way, 3 across and 7 down (row by row, dealing across 1, 2, 3-1, 2, 3, etc.).
- 7) Again, ask the spectator what row his card is in. Collect each column and place the group of cards in the selected row in between the other two groups of cards (third time).
- 8) If done correctly, their card is eleventh from the top. I usually ask a a question that I know will give me the answer of "PITTSBURGH." I then deal the cards while spelling out P-I-T-S-B-U-R-G-H and the next card (the eleventh card) will be theirs!



How many equilateral triangles are located in the image above?


